Local Healthwatch funding survey: Key findings

Publication date: 31 January 2017 (updated from October 2016)

Overview

A survey of 148 local Healthwatch, which are working across 152 local authority areas, about their funding for 2016/17 indicates that:

- For 2016/17 local Healthwatch have reported that the amount received to perform their statutory activities was £29,438,075. This compares with the 2015/16 figure of £31,812,823 received by local Healthwatch to deliver statutory functions.
- Half of local Healthwatch will maintain the same level of funding as 2015/16 or receive an increase in funding.

What is the history regarding funding for local Healthwatch?

Funding is given to local authorities to commission a local Healthwatch.

Although this funding is not ring-fenced, the Government originally announced a total of £43.5m, which was handed out to local authorities in 2013/14.

Following research indicating that only £33.5m got through to front line local Healthwatch services in 2013/14, we were asked by the Department of Health to report how much funding was being allocated to the network.

What does the funding situation look like for 2016/17?

In keeping with our statutory role in relation to commissioning arrangements and support for local Healthwatch, we will continue to support local Healthwatch during individual negotiations on budgets when requested.

We will also continue to review the information provided by local Healthwatch on funding matters, and support the Healthwatch network with advice and guidance on providing an effective, sustainable service.

We also provide local Healthwatch commissioners with regular opportunities to share best practice and identify how they can work together to support a stronger, more effective network.

With local Healthwatch also being asked to play a key part in new regional health and social care reforms, we will also promote the need for this work to be resourced effectively.
